

Misuse of statistics: Why?

- The misuse of official statistics has as a goal to misrepresent reality
- Misuse takes various forms:
 - change or undermine the statistics to bias them and misrepresent reality
 - suppress the statistics for alternative narratives to be offered
 - attack the statistics to discredit them and 'alternative facts' to be preferred
 - misrepresent the meaning of the statistics
- Forms of misuse can coexist or be practiced sequentially
- The result is often a belief by the public that 'Nothing is true and anything can be true', which can actually be desirable by those who misuse statistics

Misuse of statistics: targets

- 1. Statistical product
 - Attack
 - Suppress
 - Misinterpret
- 2. Statistical production and communication process
 - Manipulate
 - Attack
- 3. Official statisticians and statistical agencies
 - Press to manipulate/suppress statistics
 - Create incentives for self censorship
 - Attack

Misuse of statistics: what is the statistical community to do?

- Stand by official statisticians who have done their work well (which needs to be validated) when they are attacked
- Stand by and defend validated official statistics when these statistics are attacked
- Yet, must not suppress criticism of official statistics, even if it may (appear to) be unwarranted or ill intentioned
- Call out and protest suppression of official statistics

Misuse of statistics: what is the statistical community to do?

- Call out official statisticians who do not follow statistical principles and who succumb to external pressure or self-censorship – do not have a 'guild mentality'
- Call out and protest situations and persons that pressure directly or indirectly official statisticians to not follow statistical principles

Misuse of statistics: what is the statistical community to do?

- Encourage/practice 'anticipatory' communication of official statistics by statistical agencies to help prevent misuse - without taking sides in policy debates
- Encourage/practice avoidance of analysis and policy discussions when releasing or discussing official statistics
